

## INTRODUCTION & METHODOLOGY

From November 15 – November 20, 2022, DHM Research conducted a survey of Washington voters about public policy issues and voting behaviors during the 2022 general election.

**Research Methodology:** The online survey consisted of 500 Washington residents (439 who voted in the 2022 general election). This is a sufficient sample size to assess opinions generally and to review findings by multiple subgroups.

Respondents were contacted by using a professionally maintained online panel. A variety of quality control measures were employed, including questionnaire pre-testing and data validation. The sample was modeled to reflect the electorate from the November 2022 general election. To ensure a representative sample, demographic quotas were set, and data were weighted by area of state, age, gender, race, and education. Among voters, quotas were set, and data were weighted by the final vote count from the election for U.S. Senator (Patty Murray versus Tiffany Smiley).

The results presented below include responses to most of the questions asked by DHM Research during this survey. Thirteen questions, and data related to those questions have been omitted because the data belong to DHM Research clients.

**Statement of Limitations:** Any sampling of opinions or attitudes is subject to a margin of error. The margin of error is a standard statistical calculation that represents differences between the sample and total population at a confidence interval, or probability, calculated to be 95%. This means that there is a 95% probability that the sample taken for this study would fall within the stated margin of error if compared with the results achieved from surveying the entire population. The margin of error for this survey is +/- 4.4%.
